YANKEE ROBINSON SHOW

This show, when it leaves the winter quarters at Des Moines, Ia., will probably be one of the best equipped wagon shows in America. No second-hand material will be with the show. Baker & Lockwood are building all the canvas and a prominent wagon company of Kansas City will furnish ten new tableaux and baggage wagons. The stock will consist of young draft horses. The show will carry a band-wagon, four tableaux, ten cages, and calliope; Tom-Tom, the big elephant, two camels and altogether there will be over 125 people with the organization. New from toe-pin to balerings the Yankee Robinson Show will open in Des Moines in May, and will tour Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota. Pogy O'Brien, now in winter quarters, will handle the stock; Wm. Delvin, the canvas; John Stuart will have charge of the big elephant which he has taught a lot of new tricks; George Casper will be boss animal man; Lou Cannon, now in winter quarters, will manage the candy stands, and Chas. Brown has signed to play the calliope. Harry Gray will look after the dressing top and Wm. Lloyd will be at the front door. There will be two wagons in advance. The show will carry a 90-foot big top, with two 40-foot middle pieces; menagerie top, 50 with two 30's; side-show, 50-foot top with one 3; two stables 28x48; cook house, 28x48. Over 80 head of horses will be required to haul the show. The Yankee Robinson Show will make a territory railroad shows are unable to touch.

CIRCUSES VS. RAILROADS

C. L. Horton, of the Big Four Railroad announces that as far as that system is concerned that contracts with circuses will be made in 1906 at the same terms and subject to the same conditions that obtained in 1905. There will be no changes whatever. Agents and advance forces will be treated with the same liberality they were accorded last year. If the Big Four goes on record in this matter without hesitation it would seem that there is little likelihood of the other roads causing difficulty. 

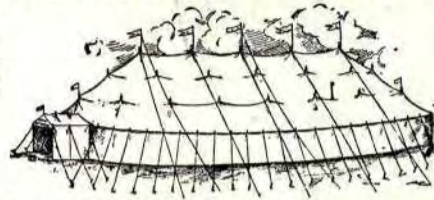

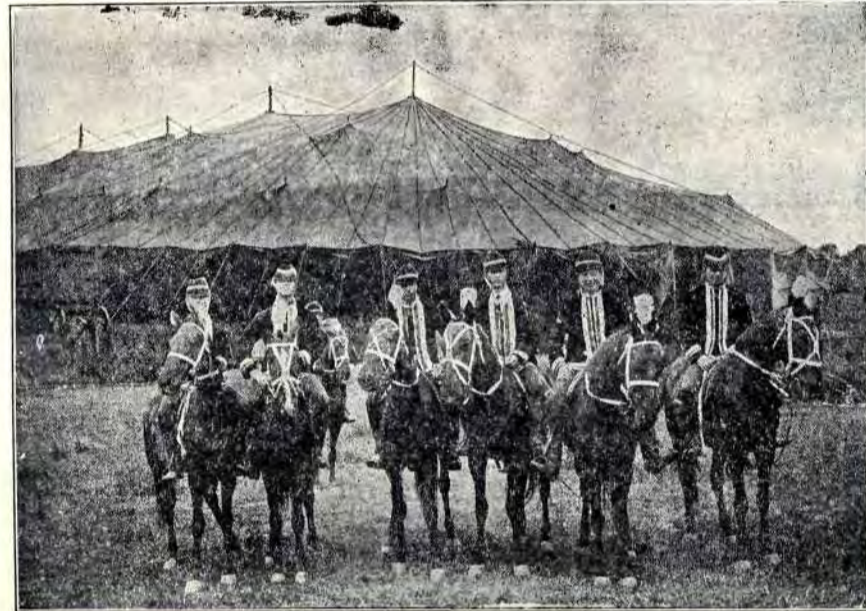
