## Show Train Rammed

A freak accident destroyed a concession department sleeper on the Ringling-Barnum Circus train (Red Unit) and injured 13 people the afternoon of June 7th. The accident occurred when freight cars rolling down a graded track at Selkirk (N.Y.) slammed into the circus train.

The freight cars were being shifted about to make up a train at the Con Rail yard. According to local officials either a switch or computer malfunctioned, causing the freight cars to be routed to the wrong track.

State police said none of the animal cars were involved in the accident. One source said the animals had been unloaded for feed-

It is also rumored they are angling to buy one of two fair-sized tent shows now on the road, a rumor I doubt. I'm more inclined to believe they'll start from scratch.

I'm sorry to report that C. J. MATCHETT, 24 hour man for the Great American, has returned to Florida to recover from a severe stroke. I was told he was laying out the lot when he fell, struck his head on a rock, resulting in a blood clot - hence the stroke. Everyone on the G-A Circus is very distressed over the incident and hopes he gets well soon.

Giant clown BUCK NOLAN, who was with Galaxy when it nose-dived in Texas, is now with the Great American... BEATTY-COLE jumps from Glassboro (NJ) overnight into the Fifth Regiment Army in Baltimore, July 1-5 for an indoor stand which, I understand, is all sold out.

Snake Charmer JOSEPHINE HELBLING, with Ringling for years, later an aerialist with the James Edgar New Sparks Circus, has a cleaning business in Sarasota... And ex-aerialist JACKIE LE CLAIR, who studied under the incomparable LALAGE, is now Sarasota's favorite hairstylist. His last show biz stint was advance flacking for RBBB.

BILLY McCABE no longer with the Freedom Train - derailed himself last fall. He is caring for KENNY DODD's ailing mother while Kenny is trouping with Beauty-Cole... Agent GILL MILLER really gets around. Memorial Day weekend found him flying to Philadelphia for talks with the MIKE DOUGLAS show, then on to Atlantic City, and finally to New York where he visited the Emmett Kelly Circus in Long Island, Prince Najev at the Onstage Night Club, and the Ringling show in Manhattan.

CIRCO CESARE TOGNI, scheduled for the Italian Market Festival in Phila., postponed its arrival due to the earthquakes in Italy. I've been told, however, the show STILL plans to visit the USA and that arrangements are being made to reschedule its showing by the Festival committee.

Russian aerial star MARINA RADULESCU came out of self-imposed retirement long enough to appear at the ONSTAGE early in May... YVONNE RAY STEPHENS, now with Famous Hunt, has her aged father on the road with her, caring for him. He is MARVIN RAY of the old La BELLE-RAY TROUPE. Vonnie has a dog act on the show, her daughter Leanne is doing traps, and husband Bob Stephens is boss props. . . . First person I saw on the Hunt lot was LUIS MUNOZ (Los Argentinos) hobbling around after someone had dropped one of the steel seat supports on his foot. . . and MARSHA HUNT JONES' husband, Don, was rushed at 3 a.m. to Emergency for removal of flying rust particles that had lodged in his eyes.

It was raining when I caught Hoxie's Great American and I am happy to report the Big Top is one of the FEW

I've sat under during a rainstorm and remained dry. . . so it's not true that ALL big tops leak like a sieve!

Well. . . another circus date blew up in the east and I was told by a VERY prominent source that many acts were left with I.O.U.'s. That's the fourth disaster in only two months and we HOPE that's the end of it!

QUICKIES: Juggling Villams to St. Louis for Sandy Dobritch. . . Mike Klucker working in Atlantic City. . . Morgan-Ashton Family on the Emmett Kelly date in L.I. . . Barbara Taggart visited Circus Kingdom, reports: "Performers are college students from various parts of the country. Their special appeal is their enthusiasm, wholesomeness, and happy appearance." . . . Syd Moore Family visited Great American on route to Great Adventure Park. . . Pappa Sulo Keppo finally made that long-awaited journey to his homeland - Finland!

ARTHUR DUCHEK's "King Arthur and the Lion" High Wire Novelty is currently headlining the Sterling Forest Funspot. Also there is BILLY RODGERS Tropical Bird Fantasy. Billy plays the park every year.

The Marquee-Canopy used by Famous Hunt covers the entire length of the midway - a GREAT innovation. . . Organist RICHARD ROSIO is making his first circus tour with Hunt. AL & SUE DAWLEY have closed their season with Castle, are back in Sarasota.

SID KELLNER is working phone promos in the south preparatory to reopening the G-M circus. He says he will run to November when he starts up again July 9. . . GARDEN BROS. has wound up its stateside tour, is back in Canada. . . SALON DU COMMERCE, now featuring Dubois Circus World, is a combination "home-show-fair" unit. They play arenas with a carnival on the parking lot and then fence the whole thing in European style. . . In the arena are exhibitors with booths, and a platform for nightly stage shows, usually featuring big name Canadian stars. The show tours Quebec and when the "home show" route is finished, plays large fairs. I was with them one season and the late JIMMY TROY played the tour several times.

If you think it's easy being a 24 hour man, just ask Dave Miller, organist, with Hoxie's G-A circus who is subbing for the ailing MATCHETT. Going from South Carolina into North Carolina on his FIRST mission he was stopped by Smokey, handed a sheaf of arrows, and a warning. Dave drove back, put the arrows up again, and was almost to the state line when Smokey caught him a second time, made Dave go back and take them down. As he was doing so, Dave marked the spots with chalk arrows. He was just to the state line when - you guessed it, the same cop stopped him one last time, angrily broke the chalk, threw it on the ground and instructed Dave NEVER to come back to South Carolina!

# SHOW REPORT

The recent demise of Show-time USA has left many bitter show folks and some now wonder if it is worth being in the business. However, all agree the show was a flashy one and provided an exciting program for spectators and as a result should have caught on.

The show was heavy on talent, one member of the organization told CR. Even then, he adds, we should have and could have made it if everyone had pulled together. The first few dates followed a generally good tour route for shows in the past and so it was a surprise to find the show was folding. Maybe it was the promotion or maybe it was an economical thing, who knows?

Baron Von Uhl made four dates then had to leave for previously signed engagements. He did leave some cats on the show for a flash. There was a daily parade and a balloon ascension, but no one ever seemed to care if the balloon went up or not.

According to one visitor who caught the show on its opening date, during the chariot races one chariot ran under the sidewall and right into three cars parked outside. One horse had to be cut out of the harness and, he adds, of course the cars were damaged. Later one of the show's motorcycle riders did the same thing, but he didn't get hurt.

Western performer John Bromfield (he was in Ring of Fear) was one of the show's hard workers. Much of the hard work was handled by the butchers who were trying to keep the thing together.

It has been reported that thousands of program books were ordered, but never delivered. The show did use a variety of lithos, one half sheet depicts a chariot race (this has been used in the past by several shows).

American Cont'l Circus broke all attendance records during their recent Portland (Ore.) engagement.

He was known as The Coney Island Fakir and The King of Koins.

CHARLES A. NOCK (46), a member of the famous Nock circus family. Died at his home in Florida on June 1st, after choking on some food.

ELMER (Scotty) SCHRADER (67) died at Sheboygan, Wisc. on May 14th. He was born in Sheboygan, the son of Emil and Alma Lindemann Schrader. He traveled with the Seils-Sterling Circus, which was owned by his uncles, the Lindemann brothers.

JACK W. WAIN (71) died at Monmouth, Ill. on Apr. 22nd. He was a professional magician for over 20 years and was known as Jack La Wain. For 25 years he operated a magic supply shop in Monmouth.

# tour ends in wisc.

There were plenty of thrills and excitement in the program provided by Europorama's 1976 edition, making it one of the top shows of the country. The show, produced by John Winn, who also does most of the booking, will wind up its tour this week at Manitowoc, Wisc., on June 22nd.

We've had a nice tour, John told CR, and we've been working for most of the same sponsors for over six years. Each year we add a few more towns to the route, he continued, and last year we moved into the mid-west for the first time.

The show program featured: The Stanoffs, bar act; Mike Makado, hand balancing; Clowns (2); Los Comancheros, aerialists; Iris Keppo, globe/contortion; Rudy Docki, comedy clowning; The Winn Bros., wire walk; Rudy Docki musical number; The Stewarts, gorilla parody; Rosell Troupe, high wire.

The second half included: Miss Roberta, slide for life; The Flying Rauls (4); Clowns; Spanish web display (6); The Luyban Trio, perch pole; Los Martinez, teeterboard; Jorge's Comedy Car and the Winn's Aerial Motorcycle.

The program was backed by a five piece band, directed by Vince Greco. The show's announcer was Chris Fox.

Big crowds have been attending the Sells & Gray Circus performances and the side show, under Henry Thompson, is also doing quite good.

## Answer Is No

State park officials in New York have, for all practical purposes, ruled that two French wire walkers can not perform over the Niagara Falls in September. ## FAMOUS HUNT - A family affair

AFTER A HIATUS of 12 years the Hunt title, founded in 1892, is back in operation. Now in its second season, Famous Hunt (as it is called) is owned and operated by Marsha Hunt Jones, daughter of Harry T. Hunt, "We are the oldest circus in the U.S.," says Marsha, "that has never changed hands, never been sold to an outsider."

The Hunt Circus has always been a family affair - from its inception as a wagon show in the 19th century to its large motorized era in later years and, along the east coast, has become somewhat of an institution.

When the Hunt Bros. Circus folded its tents in 1963 it was a big three-ringer with tons of equipment, lots of animals, and a sterling reputation for honesty and fair-dealing. Future tours were discontinued because of Harry's failing health. "My heart was acting up," Harry told CR, "so I closed the show to buy myself some time." The equipment and animals were then disposed of - some to Doc Bartok (who toured the old Hunt show route) and to Hoxie Tucker.

A decision to revive the Hunt title was Marsha's. "But there was nothing left except one trailer and the name - absolutely NOTHING! I had to start all over. And," Marsha said, pausing in making novelty stock, "please tell your readers that although the Hunt title is back, and I am a Hunt, this is a NEW show with a NEW format."

That may be...but...reviewing the intimate performance under a red, white and blue 85 ft. square big top with a 42 ft. middle, Time seemed to turn back on itself. So strong was the charm and flavor of a real old-time, old-fashioned circus (despite modern day color spotlights and effects) that this unadulterated nostalgia was

transmitted instantaneously to an enthusiastic audience who squealed in delight right along with the kids.

The Hunts have always been innovators - the first to develop an air-conditioned big top, were always willing to try the untried and untested. Marsha is no exception. This season's innovation is the 60 ft. long marquee that covers the entire midway. To the left and right are the usual candy wagon, concession stands, office, and an elaborate 32 ft. Wells Cargo cookhouse. The back opens on to the midway, serves as a "greasejoint", separated inside by a kitchen complete with deep freeze, hot and cold running water. The remainder is given over to a professional "Diner" look, painted white with white curtains, and booths along the sides. The air-conditioned unit, designed by Don Jones, Marsha's husband, is one of the cleanest, most functional ever seen.

"Our working men's sleeper is clean too," says Marsha. "They have fresh sheets and a built in shower. And we make them keep it clean!"

Famous Hunt is a tightly framed circus touring on 12 show owned units, carrying an elephant ride and bubble bounce but no side or pit shows. New steel seating, utilizing long beams that bolt together, supported by only one set of jacks, 14 high, seats 2000. There are no reserves. The big top, still in good condition despite a rainy, muddy spring is not spooled. The show uses a fork lift.

"We had two major disappointments so our program is not as strong as I would like," Marsha told CR. "One troupe cancelled the day before we opened. So please be kind."

I didn't have to be. It is the audience, after all, who judges a show, and the audience on the day caught (May 31, Linwood, Pa) certainly enjoyed what they had paid to see.

Performance runs an hour and a half with intermission and features The Los Argentinos, perch; Miss Tina, upside down walk and revolves; Miss Yvonne's canines, Miss Leanne, trapeze; The Oreste Cannistrelli's two horse presentations - high school and long-rein dressage; Miss Teresa with Dolly, the baby elephant; Les Marx, horizontal bars, a Bicentennial Finale, plus juggling, balancing, and animal acts.

Clowning is done by Pizza and Nick Nastasi and music is provided by drummer Barney Barnhart and organist Richard Rosio. Staff includes Marsha Hunt Jones, owner, mgr.; Harry T. Hunt, contracting agent; Don Jones, office; Bob Owen, announcer assist. mgr.; Luis Munoz, program dir. & supt.; Don Owen, canvas; Rickert McConnell, 24 hr.; Lonnie Brackett, elec. & mechanic; Bob Stephens, boss props; Bob Momyer, press.

At intermission a photo gallery is set up inside the big top where Pizza the clown poses for color polaroids (mounted in souvenir folders) with the small fry which seemed to be doing a fast turnover.

One of the nicest things about Famous Hunt is the show has one day a week off, usually Sunday. If the rare Sunday is booked then Monday is open. Marsha explained: "I am firmly convinced that every time we play a Sunday we have nothing but trouble. Besides, if we can't make it in six days then we'd better pack it up and take it home!"

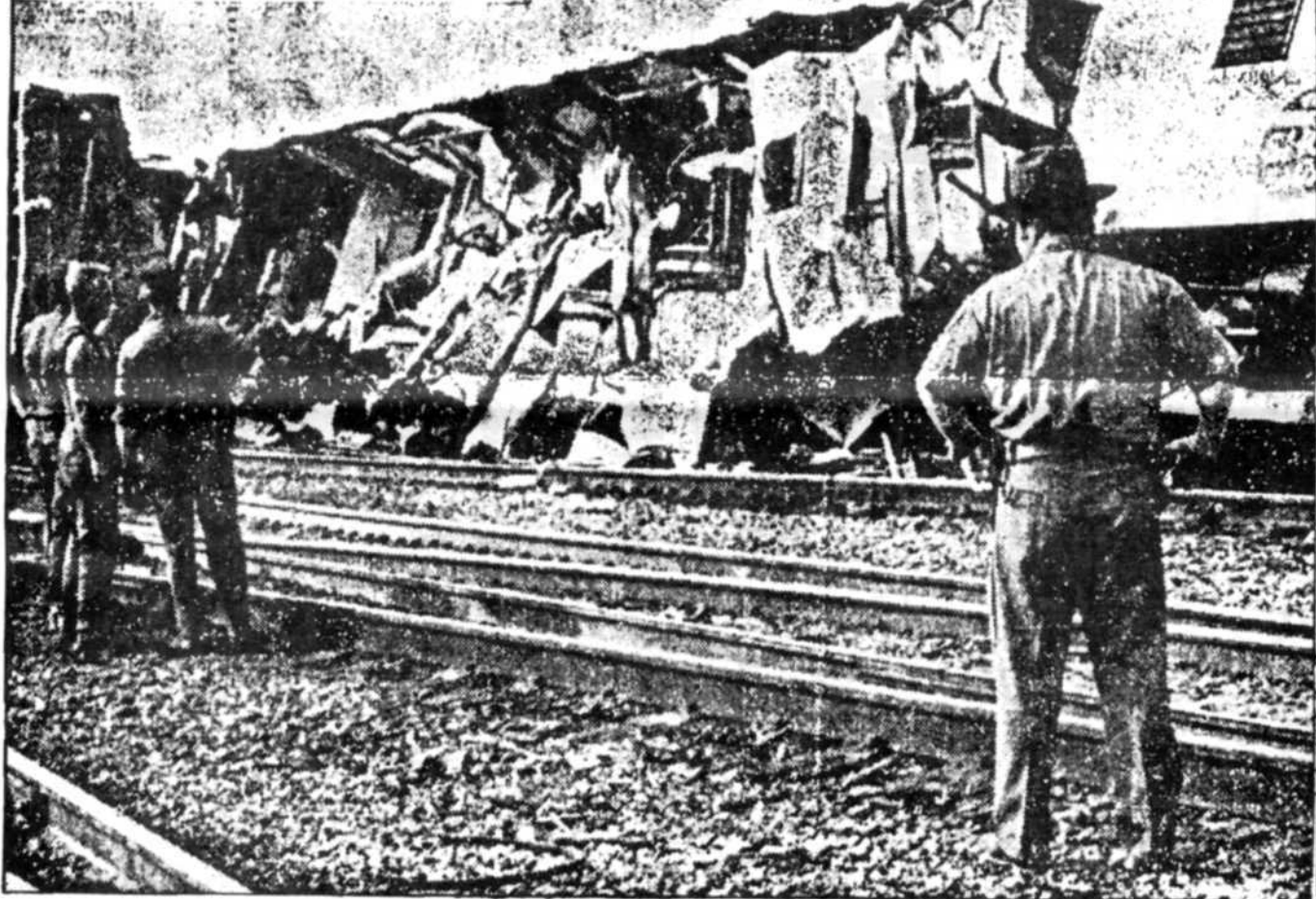
