## Circus Makes Its Debut

The Great American Bicentennial Circus, produced for the United Methodist Church by Rev. Thomas Bracewell, and staged and directed by Paul Cristiani, will make its debut at Panama City, Fla., on Aug. 27-28.

The show already reports complete sell-outs for its initial engagements and has found it necessary to expand its routing program. Dates are currently booked in Florida, Alabama and in Tennessee.

Only professional acts are to be used in the circus program. Already the following stars have been signed: Emmett Kelly, Sr./; Lilli Kristensen and her leopards; the Oscar Cristiani elephants; the Flying Armors; Scotts unrideable mule and football dogs; The Zerbini Bros.; The Chesterfields; Miss Caron Cristiani French, etc.

The animals were being trucked to Texas when they were unloaded for a feed and water stop at Hugo. After getting their fill they took off into the nearby dense forest area.



Ringling's Red Unit pulled near capacity houses, plus some turnaways, during its July 15-30 engagement at the Forum in Inglewood (Calif.) Observers now believe that the show has probably broken the big attendance records set by the Blue Unit last year.

Despite bad weather and a shortage of help, the Sells & Gray Circus has been pulling some good business, including several straw houses. Increases have been noted in all departments, a recent report indicated, except for the concessions.

## Why?

The Dailey Bros. Circus recently played here at Forsyth (Montana) and I want you to have one of the tickets. The show played to two straw houses, but left a bad impression.

The local sponsor was very upset over the advertising of ticket prices. It was announced that tickets would be \$1.50 if purchased downtown, or \$2.00 on the show grounds - instead the price was \$3.00 each. Children under 5 yrs were admitted for half price, but everyone over that age had to pay the full price.

As a good CFA member and a former circus man it was a disappointing circus.

Modoc, the elephant, died at the San Francisco (Cal.) zoo on July 19th, from after effects of an operation.

While the show has been hit by mud, rain, winds and even tornados, their major problem has been the lack of help. The circus carries a sleeper for 20 workmen, but for the most part their crew has consisted of three men on the side show and three men on the big top.

1 - Advertising was not up to that of previous years and virtually no promotion of the show's stars was used.

2 - The engagement director spent more time traveling between Monroe and Portland (Ore) than he did promoting the town.

3 - Other billboards there were no window cards or lithos in town, except for one auto show room. Local papers used a photo of the advance clown after he had left.

It was a nostalgic day and all are grateful to Dory Miller for this kind gesture of being treated to the afternoon show. It was also a memorable day for Shirley Lindemann Bentley, as her daughters - Robbin, Duina and Malissa - took part in the circus program. Duina will be with C&B for the balance of the 1975 season.

Mrs. Al Lindemann, the last of the original family visited the lot for a few hours to reminisce. Also attending the circus were Mr. and Mrs. Orval Lindemann.

The C&B band (6 pieces) is directed by Emil Hahn who does an outstanding job.

Dutch Crawford, ringmaster, adds luster to the performance, with his clear and pleasing announcements. He also works a liberty act and six elephants.

It is impossible to name all the skilled performers in the circus, but it would be amiss not to mention Capt. Donald Carr, whose exciting steel arena act includes tigers and lions.

Mr. Dory Miller, the show's President and Director, has been in show business since he was a child. He's been a circus owner since 1937, making him the longest continuous circus owner in America today. Under his guidance the C&B Circus has become a favorite of fans everywhere.

We've been busy visiting several circuses this season and have really enjoyed everyone of them.

Saw Circus Vargas at Skokie (Ill.) and the show certainly lived up to our expectations. The layout was impressive even though they were squeezed into a tight lot. The day we were on the lot they had about a half a house.

On July 4th we visited the Circus World Museum and what a great day that was. It was a hot day, but the Holter and Gibbs animal shows were still great. The museum even has some new displays and their miniature circus has been improved.

Sells & Gray were at Menominee on July 26th, where they drew fair crowds. Their big top is a 70 with three 40's, with blue and white sidewall. The side show/menagerie is a 50 with two 30's, while the cook-house semi used a canopy off one side. Everything there looked to be in good shape.

On July 29th we went over to Kimberly (Wisc.) to see the Carson & Barnes Circus and it's really some show. The big top looked good, but was minus one center section, probably because of their blowdown in Nebraska. As a result the 5th ring was set up between an end center pole and the quarter poles, but it didn't detract from the performance.

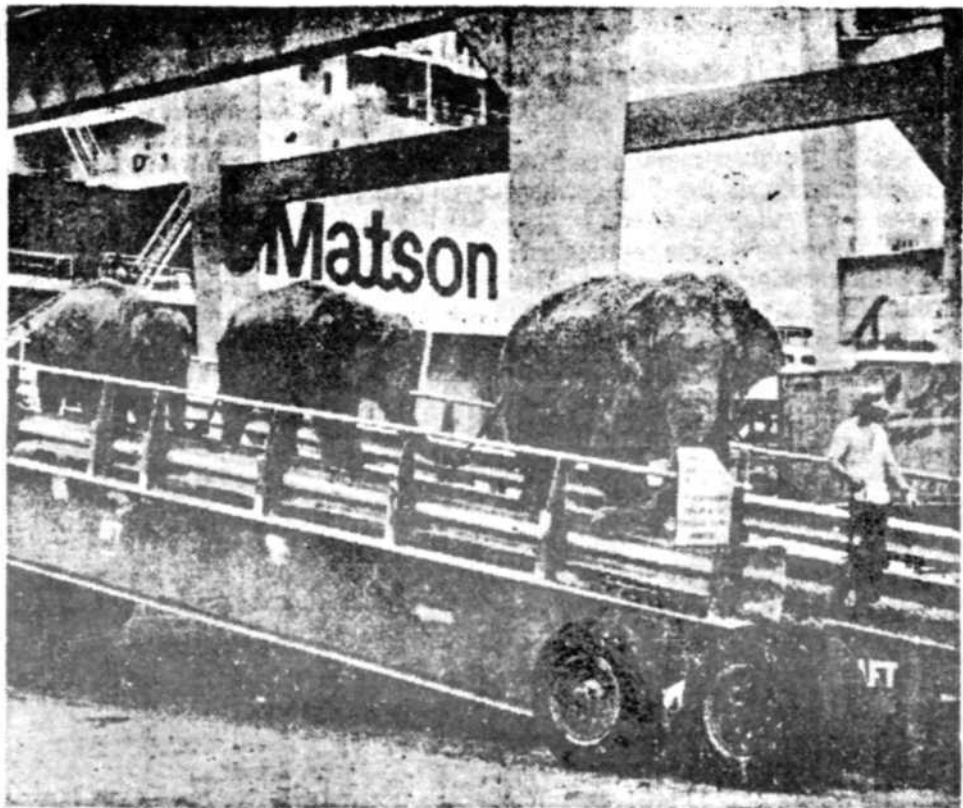

# AN EDITORIAL

We have to concede some amazement at reaction to certain articles which appear on the pages of Circus Report.

It makes us wonder what you would have us do when there are dishonest deals going on? Bury our heads in the sand? Turn our backs and not report it?

This would be a pretty lousy paper if it gave only the nice, rosy and happy side of life - but failed to inform you of those things which can bring down show business, if they are not brought to the public's attention.

We just tell it like it is. The problem is that some people don't like to read about the truth, or the evil or the ugly or the dangerous things that are happening all around.

They say things would be "happier" if the people didn't know, if they weren't told - if they didn't see - or hear - or read about them.

We try to give you responsible, fair journalism - reporting to you the happenings of show business. Don't kill the messenger - change those happenings that upset you so.

That's what freedom of the press is all about! We report what's happening so that you - the public - can be informed, and in turn, either leave things as they are or change them.

## CHARGE FILED

The parents of an Antioch (Calif.) girl whose arm was bitten off by a bear, have filed a suit for \$2 million. The claim, against Contra Costa County, charges officials knew the bear was there and dangerous, yet did nothing to prevent an accident.

The incident occurred on June 26th, in an isolated area where the family was hiking. They came upon the bear, caged behind cyclone fencing, at the back of property owned by Robert Westbrook. It is assumed that the girl reached inside the cage to pet the bear when her arm was bitten off above the elbow.

County officials report the Asian bear was docile during its rabies observation time. Except for one time when it hit its owner it has no record of being vicious.

The little girl (2 yrs) was released from a local hospital in good condition after a stay of several weeks.
